1603	King James I of England becomes the first Stuart monarch.		
1605	The Gunpowder Plot		
1642- 1651	The English Civil War. This is made up of three separate wars that are fought between Charles I and Parliament.		
1649	Charles I is tried and convicted of treason by Parliament and is beheaded.		
1653	After Charles I's execution, England, Scotland and Ireland becomes known as the Commonwealth. Oliver Cromwell becomes Lord Protector.		
1660	The Restoration. Charles II is crowned king.		
1665	The Great Plague.		
1666	The Great Fire of London.		
1688	The Glorious Revolution. Parliament becomes the main ruling power.		
1707	The Act of Union is passed, joining together England and Scotland as Great Britain.		
1714	Queen Anne dies, ending the Stuart period.		

Key Facts	Facts			
What was the Gunpowder Plot?	The Gunpowder Plot was a plot to kill King James I and his government by blowing up the Houses of Parliament.			
Why was there a plot?	The plotters were all Catholic. They thought that King James I was being unfair to Catholics because he was a Protestant. They did not want him to be the king any more.			
Did the plot succeed?	The plot failed. Guy Fawkes was found with gunpowder in the cellar at the Houses of Parliament.			

James I

Already James VI of Scotland. He was the cousin of Elizabeth I so when she died she decreed that he should become king of England.
